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## Letter from the Chair

As we enter the 2015 giving season, I'd like to thank you and our many friends for supporting the ATS Foundation Research Program.

Our Funds for the Future Campaign goal for research is to **raise \$700,000 by December 31, 2015**. Please make your gift today and help ensure the Foundation's ability to increase the number of unrestricted grants we award in 2016.

Your support of the Research Program has really made a difference. In the wake of across-the-board cuts authorized by Congress in 2013 and 2014, the NIH could not fund many outstanding research proposals. The Foundation responded by awarding 13 young investigators who just missed the NIH pay line \$40,000 each to continue their research, gather more data, and sharpen their proposals to NIH and other funders.

These researchers have **gone on to secure \$8 million in total committed funding** from the NIH, Burroughs-Wellcome, the Parker B. Francis Foundation, and other funders. That's a fantastic return on investment, thanks to the generous contributions you and our research partners have made.

The ATS has contributed \$200,000 to the Foundation in honor of the Research Program's tenth anniversary and has challenged everyone to join together and match this gift dollar for dollar to help retain young investigators in careers in pulmonary, critical care, and sleep medicine.

The Funds for the Future Campaign also includes: MECOR, Medical Education Research, Assembly Awards & Scholarships, and the Ziskind Clinical Research Scholar Award. No matter what program inspires you, **thank you for your generosity, and have a wonderful holiday season!** ■

Despite the fact that Heather Snyder's father died of pulmonary fibrosis when Heather was nine, her breathing problems were misdiagnosed as asthma, until her mother insisted she get an x-ray.

"Things went rapidly downhill from there," recalls Heather, who came within hours of her life when she received a double-lung transplant.

Although looking forward to the fifth anniversary of her transplant because she feels better every year, Heather believes that transplantation offers an incomplete answer to this deadly and puzzling lung disease.

"We need research to find medications that stop the progression of pulmonary fibrosis and research to find a cure," she says. "Patients need hope and research is hope. I want to know that the next generation of patients can survive." ■
